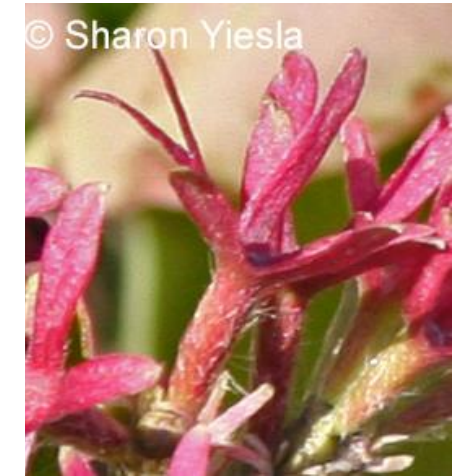




Small, white, tubular flowers in clusters of seven, held on panicles. Stamens are long and obvious, extending out from the flowers. Flowers appear in late summer.

After the white flowers fade, the sepals turn pink and persist, giving the plant the appearance of flowering again.

The fruit is a capsule within the base of the persistent calyx.



The opposite leaves are simple, with entire margins. Three closely spaced veins are seen in the middle of the leaf.

Stems are reddish brown; maturing to a tan or buff color. Small ridges are seen on young stems, while older stems begin to exfoliate. Buds are imbricate; at a 45 degree angle to the stem.

Seven sons flower is a large shrub to small tree and is often multi-stemmed.



Bark exfoliates into brown and whitish layers.
